Using cost information to improve performance: are you getting it right?

Councils spent £21 billion in 2011/12 – almost £40,000 every minute. Councillors need good cost information to ensure every pound achieves good value for local communities.

Key messages

- Councillors need good cost information to scrutinise performance effectively.
- Councils need to understand their costs to assess whether they are delivering value for money.
- The financial challenges in the public sector are demanding more effective use of cost information.
- Councils could do more to share good practice and learn from each other.
- Good cost information can help communities understand the challenges that councils face in delivering services.

An effective council will...

- know how much it costs to deliver core services
- compare its performance and costs internally and with other councils and organisations to make value-formoney assessments
- use this information to inform decisions about what services to provide and how best to provide them.

Key questions for councillors

- When I am scrutinising performance do I get the information I need on both the quality and the cost of services?
- When I am presented with decisions to make, are policy choices supported with information on the cost implications of those choices?
- Am I supported to understand and make best use of the cost information that is presented to me?
